This morning, before business commenced in the Police Court, Judge Snell defivered the following opinion and order:

following opinion and order:

OPINION OF THE COURT.

From a careful examination of the revised laws of the listrict of Columbia, and the effect of this revision, I feel justified to issuing the following order, changing direction of process in all cases within the original and exclusive jurisdiction of the Police Court from the United States Marshalt of the Major of Police.

Sec. 1,066 provides: "In cases cognizable in the Supreme Court, the process shall be directed to the marshal, except in cases of emergency, when it may be directed to the Major of Police."

In defining the duties of the United States Attorney in the Police Court, sec. 1,020 provides: "It shall be the duty of the United States Attorney for the District, in person, or by one or more of his assistants or deputies, to attend to the prosecution in the Police Court, of such offences, as were cognizable in the Criminal Court of the District prior to June 17, 1870." The collation of these sections show that

the attorneys are to attend to the "cases cor.
nizable" in the Supreme Court by virtue of
its original and exclusive jurisdiction as it

of the Police Court was created and defined.

The distinction is plainly marked between "cognizable" and "well cognizable" as here used. The onlission of the word "now" from the revision was evidently done to remove all doubt on this point, and it is clear that process should now be directed to the United States marshal only "in capital and oth rwise infamous crimes," that is to say felonies, as they are the only cases cognizable originally in the Supreme Court, and even in these provision is made that in case of emergency, process may be directed to the major of police.

I do not deem it necessary to state any other reasons in support of this view.

These reasons will readily occur to, any one disposed to examine the subject, but centent myself with observing that it gives the court and the District the full benefit of the services of the ballism and Metropolitan police—as must have been intended by Cougress, and will very materially add to the revenues of the court, but what is more important, I am fully satisfied, that this is the true censtruction of the statutes as they now stand.

THE PRESBYTERY OF WASHINGTON.—
